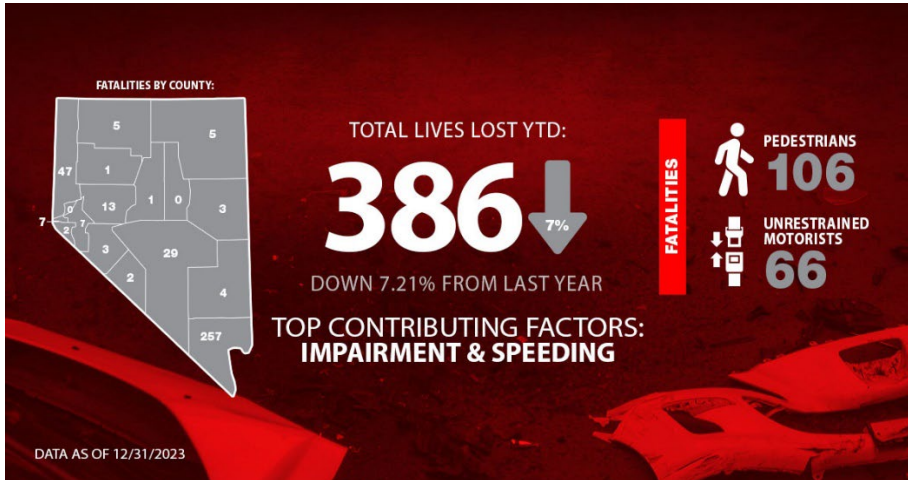

- Nevada Advisory Committee on Traffic Safety Updates:

- Reno Police Department Oral Fluid Devices
 - To supply more high-tech devices to law enforcement officers, RPD has a new grant request to OTS for 41 oral fluid devices. Now, trying to get purchase order for oral fluid devices as the money must be spent by September 28.
- Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT) Updates:
 - FHWA special rule for vulnerable road users (VRU), requiring a VRU Safety Assessment, to specifically address the safety of everyone who walks and rolls, with a focus on crash data and equity. Results from the VRU Assessment will be shared at the Safety Summit. The Assessment is due to FHWA on November 15, 2023.
- Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) Updates:
 - Nevada Traffic Safety Summit will be Sept 12-14 in Las Vegas. More info: [2023 Traffic Safety Summit - Zero Fatalities \(zerofatalitiesnv.com\)](http://zerofatalitiesnv.com).
- NHTSA Updates:
 - Impaired Driving Law Enforcement Summit June 21 in Denver (joint event with MADD).

Strategies and Action Steps

- Consortium for evidence-Based Curricula
 - Submitted a draft for revision on language change.
 - At least 15 (8 hours) driver school classes on DUI using evidence-based curriculum with licensed counselor of self-awareness, realization, and taking initiatives to make behavioral changes. There will be meetings for five (5) days. Lindsay Saner will send out emails and ask for support on preparing agenda for the meetings.
- 2024 Grant Agreement is waiting for signature.
- In 2023 Nevada Traffic Safety Summit, there will be an informative event on oral fluid and blood testing and legal issues. Lieutenants will share their experiences on using fluid and blood testing. There will also be a training session on Smart Start's Ignition Interlock Device. The training will focus on tempering devices, statistics on devices, and violation of devices.

IMPAIRED DRIVING



Illegal Per Se Impaired Driving Laws

- GHSA supports BAC level for DUI at .08
- Recommends per se BAC level for DUI at .05
- Encourages zero tolerance drug impairment laws for illicit drugs
- Calls for research on per se limit for marijuana and other drugs



Impaired Driving Offenses

- Urges separate sanctions for alcohol- and drug-impaired driving
- Recommends enhanced penalties for multiple drug use while driving
- Considers alcohol and other drugs combination as an aggravated offense



Detecting and Prosecuting Impaired Drivers

- Emphasizes the importance of detecting impaired drivers
- Supports use of electronic warrants and criminal justice data systems
- Encourages training for law enforcement on identifying drugged drivers



Impaired Driving Prosecution, Adjudication, Supervision, and Treatment

- Advocates for tailored sanctions and treatment for high-risk impaired drivers
- Recommends increased training for prosecutors and judges
- Supports repeat impaired driving laws with specific penalties



Administrative License Suspension or Revocation

- Supports prompt administrative license suspension for DUI arrests
- Encourages expanding Administrative License Revocation laws for drug-impaired drivers



Vehicle Sanctions

- Encourages penalties to deter DUI offenders from driving
- Supports ignition interlock devices for first-time offenders
- Urges research on interlock devices by convicted drunk drivers



High-Risk Impaired Driving Offenders

- Urges states to identify high-risk impaired drivers
- Supports enhanced penalties for high BAC and repeat offenders
- Advocates for integration of administrative, criminal justice, and treatment systems



Open Container Laws

- Encourages laws prohibiting the consumption of alcohol in vehicles
- Advocates for similar laws in states where marijuana is legal



Driving While Suspended

- Addresses the issue of impaired drivers with suspended licenses
- Recommends applying vehicle sanction laws to impaired drivers with suspended licenses



Enforcement of DUI Laws

- Supports sobriety checkpoints and DUI patrols
- Emphasizes equitable enforcement of DUI laws



BAC/Drug Testing and Reporting

- Advocates for improved BAC/drug testing laws
- Urges states to support training
- Urges tougher penalties for impaired driving offenders who refuse tests



Designated Driver Programs

- Supports community-based designated driver programs
- Encourages implementation for persons aged 21 and above



Server Training Programs

- Recommends the development of a model server training program
- Encourages states to enact mandatory server training laws



- Highlights the benefits of DUI courts in addressing offender behavior
- Urges states to implement DUI courts where appropriate

DUI Offender Monitoring

- Advocates for DUI offender monitoring programs
- Supports the use of continuous alcohol monitoring and 24/7 sobriety programs



Plea Bargaining and Diversion Programs

- Addresses diversion programs and plea bargaining in lieu of criminal conviction
- Recommends restricting plea bargaining and limiting diversion programs or eliminate them altogether



Court Monitoring

- Highlights court monitoring as an effective tool
- Encourages states to use court monitoring to strengthen DUI adjudication



Alcohol Screening, Assessments and Treatment

- Recommends screening and assessments for offenders
- Supports treatment for addressing substance abuse issues



Self-Sufficient Impaired Driving Programs

- Advocates for state-funded impaired driving programs
- Encourages additional funding through fees and fines on offenders



Underage Drinking and Drug Use

- Addresses the issues of underage drinking and drug use
- Advocates for comprehensive approaches and enforcement programs
- Urges states to enact laws to hold shops responsible for selling to minors
- Support programs directed to college/universities education



Alcohol and Cannabis Advertising

- Opposes legislative initiatives to reduce alcohol excise taxes
- Supports using alcohol taxation funds for impaired driving education and enforcement



DUI Task Forces

- Encourages states to establish and maintain DUI task forces
- Highlights the responsibilities of DUI task forces



Taxes on Alcoholic Beverages
